Course Description

The Master said, "Only one who bursts with enthusiasm do I instruct; only one who bubbles with excitement do I enlighten. If I hold up one corner and a person cannot come back to me with the other three, I do not continue the lesson."

Asia cannot be well understood without comprehension about varied expressions of religious belief and practice, their history and impacts upon contemporary development. This introductory course is to familiarize students with the ways in which sacred realities and practices have become an important and dynamic factor in Asia. Many religions have originated from Asia, such as Hinduism, Sikhism, Jainism, Buddhism, Confucianism, Daoism/Taoism, and Shinto, although other religions, such as Christianity and Islam, have penetrated much of Asia as well. Particular emphasis will be given upon the religions' origins, beliefs/doctrines, scriptures, rituals, practices, and contemporary issues. In order to be successful in the course, students need to be curious, appreciative, and critical.

Learning Objectives

- <u>Developing Academic Skills</u>: a. Thinking critically of religion in general and of religions in Asia in particular; b. Reading texts and speaking about religion critically; c. Writing academic essays about religion.
- <u>Understanding Key Concepts</u>, such as religion, the sacred, scripture, belief, ritual, and practice.
- <u>Understanding Key Topics</u>: the historical and geographical origins of religions, their histories, scriptures, deities, beliefs and doctrines, rituals, cultural expressions, differentiation, interaction and adaptation, and recent developments.
