Course Description

This upper-division course deals with the important aspects of the Qur'an: history, content, approaches and the various ways of Muslims' interaction with it. It focuses on contexts in which the Qur'anic text originated, combining Muslim and non-Muslim studies of the Qur'an, and on the roles the Qur'an plays in the religious, cultural, and political experiences of Muslim societies. It highlights issues of multiple levels upon which the Qur'an conveys its meaning to its readers.

The course seeks not only to familiarize the students with historical and doctrinal dimensions of the Qur'an but also to engage them in critical discussion and in writing on various aspects of the Scripture. It will give them with some analytical tools for understanding and explaining the text, context, and for approaching of the Qur'an, as well as for a comparative approach in a dialogue with other scriptural traditions and scholarships.

Course Requirements and Grading

- Class attendance and participation. Regular attendance, asking questions, making comments, answering questions, participation in weekly discussions and participation will be considered as "active class participation". The discussions are intended to assist the students to thoughtfully analyze topics and issues pertaining to the Qur'an. It accounts for 15% of the total grade. Every absence beyond family and health emergency is a reduction of 2 points of the attendance grade.
- A short personal essay on "what I know, what I don't know about the Qur'an, and what I want to learn from this course," 2 pages and double-spaced. A hard copy is due on Thursday, January 10th in the classroom. No safe assignment. It accounts for 2.5 % of the total grade.
- **2 (two) academic essays** accounts for 15 % each of the total grade. Each student will write a paper in a topic or issue based on the lectures and readings. Each paper is between 4-5 pages and double-spaced. Topics will be suggested, but students may choose a topic related to the Qur'an after consulting to the

instructor. <u>The first essay</u> will be on Thursday, January 24th, and the <u>second essay</u> will be due on Thursday, February 14th. Graduate students will write 6-7 pages.

- **A take-home exam** will be due on Thursday, February 28th. It accounts for 20 % of the final grade.
- A group (2-4 students) project and its report related to the Qur'an, its interpretation and impact in society, will be due in class on Thursday, March 14th, and accounts for 10 % of the total grade. It can be a short essay on interpretation of the passage of the Qur'an, a video recording of Qur'anic recitation and its translation or interpretation, a Qur'anic calligraphy with translation and interpretation, or other forms of work, a project that will be further discussed in the classroom. Presentations of students work will take place in the classroom on March 14th, 2019. The report is due on March 19th.
- A final essay accounts for 20 % of the final grade. The final paper is 6-7 pages, typed and double-spaced, and a hard copy and a safe assignment will be due on Tuesday, March 19th, 5:00 p.m. in the instructor's office INTN 2018. Graduate students will write 9-10 pages.
- **A short essay**, about "what I have learned about the Qur'an and what I expect to do next", accounting for 2.5%. A hard copy will be due on Tuesday, March 19^{th,} 5 p.m., in the instructor's office INTN 2018: 2 pages, double-spaced, and typed. No Safe Assignment.
