Course Description

This upper-division undergraduate course explores Islam, its scriptures, and Muslims' interpretations of Islam from the past to the contemporary time, by means of an active and interactive learning, including of the use of the UCR campus libraries. It focuses on the history and content of the Qur'an and the Hadith (Prophetic Tradition), and Islamic traditions of theology, philosophy, law, mysticism, gender, education and contemporary issues. Students are equipped with some theoretical and methodological tools for understanding Islam as a dynamic and multi-faceted religion of one fifth of the world population today.

Learning Objectives

- **Developing Academic Skills:** a. Thinking critically of Islam and religion in general; b. Reading texts and speaking critically; c. Writing academic essays; d. Working together on creative project
- **<u>Understanding Key Concepts</u>**: such as religion, God, ritual, law, gender, jihad, and pluralism.
- <u>Understanding Subject Matters</u>: Allah, Muhammad, the Qur'an, pillars of Islam, iman or faith, shari'a or law, Sufism, madrasa, and diversity of Islam and Muslims.

Course Requirements and Grading

- <u>Class attendance and participation</u> (20 points = 10 % of the final grade). Regular attendance, asking questions, making comments, and participation in discussions are considered active class participation. Every lecture requires students' engagement. Students are required to read the materials before class. There will be a mosque visit on one of the Fridays (date to be announced).
- <u>Weekly essays</u>, due every Tuesday, double-spaced. The first one is about "What I know and what I want to know about Islam and Muslims" due in class on Thursday, March 31, and the last one is about "What I have learned about Islam and Muslims from this course" due in class on Tuesday, June 2. All the other weekly essays are your thoughtful responses to any particular subject matters covered during lectures, readings, mosque

Friday visit before each Tuesday (10 weeks = 10 essays = 40 points = 20 % of the total grade).

- <u>First Essav</u> (50 points = 20 %, 4-5 pages) is due in class and Safe Assignment on Thursday, April 21
- <u>A take-home written exam</u> (50 points = 20%) is due in class and Safe Assignment on Thursday, May 19.
- <u>Response Essay on</u> Ayad Akhtar's *Disgraced: A Play* (3-4 pages) is due in class on Thursday, June 2.
 <u>Or A group creative project, group presentation, and individual 1 page-report of the project</u> (groups of 5 students), due <u>on Thursday, June 2</u>: The project can be short story, calligraphy, poster, poem, drama, dance, music, song, video, game, brochure, power point presentation, or any piece of creative work. Presentations of the projects will be held at the end of class on each week starting on April 21 and ending on June 2 (for a maximum of 10 minutes). (20 points = 10%)
- <u>Final Essav</u> (50 points = 20 %, 4-5 pages), double-spaced, due in class and Safe Assignment on Thursday, June 2.
